- 1. Opening attention-grabber. Use a compelling fact, an interesting quote, or a powerful mini-story (anecdote) to set the tone of the debate.
- 2. Good morning/afternoon/evening. Because my partner and I agree with (or feel that ... or ...), we stand in firm affirmation (negation) of the resolution which states:

RESOLVED: Debaters are not adequately prepared for tournament competition

Definitions – offer definitions for words and concepts that will be important to the resoution. Adequately, prepared and tournament are examples.

2. **Our first contention is**: Debaters are not adequately prepared for tournament competition because they do not spend enough time conducting research.
